BLADE Show attendees will have the opportunity to handle brand-new pieces like the Taylor Brands Smith & Wesson Black Ops series of folders. Gripping an anodized-aluminum handle molded in a turtle-shell-like texture, it's a cinch to manipulate the "finger actuator" for seamless release of the assisted-opening blade.

West adds, "anyone who's ever found themselves fenced in or limited by property lines."

The Mantis MF-5 Breach features a stainless steel blade and handle frame, a Besh Wedge pry tip, and a non-slip grip fashioned from recycled dirt-bike tire rubber, complete with the tread intact for a patterned effect. The frame and rubber overlay are split lengthwise into two handle halves that, when opened and closed, operate the wire cutters integral to the

guard. The glass breaker at the handle butt seconds as a lock to secure the handle halves together when not using the wire cutter. The manufacturer's suggested retail price (MSRP): \$150.

A second knife employing a Beshara Besh Wedge—the TOPS Besh G2G—will make its debut at the BLADE Show. The G2G (Good To Go) fixed-blade fighter sports a 4.75-inch, stonewashed 440C stainless steel blade, 3/16-inch thick with an extended tang, a black G-10 handle
